BA (Hons) Politics with Public Administration – SH 357

1. Context and Objectives (including relevant competencies)

This course has been designed to provide students with a profound knowledge and understanding about politics and public administration including political systems, laws and governance. Public administrators are involved at different levels of government whether locally or internationally and they administer all kinds of organisations including non-governmental organisations, associations or interest groups. Public managers also are concerned with the diverse interests of government including defense, national security, social welfare, infrastructure, environment, finance and human resource. This programme therefore aims at providing graduates the skills and competencies to work in the private and public sector including teaching, civil service, media, public relations, research, and international and regional organisations.

2. Learning Outcomes

Graduates in Politics with Public Administration will:

- gain an understanding about the work of public administrators in the different types of institutions, and the political and historical context within which the institutions operate.
- discuss the conceptual and theoretical foundations of politics and public administration.
- assess the link between politics and administration.
- examine the responsibilities of the public service, and the prospects and challenges they put on public action.
- acquire the professional skills in different fields such as planning, finance and budgeting, personnel, and evaluation.
- understand the importance of ethics and values in public service.
- acquire the knowledge, skills and values to be both effective and responsible public administrators.
- Develop the basic academic skills to conduct research in the fields of politics and public administration.

3. Teaching and Learning Methods

Main teaching methods are lectures, tutorials, seminars and working groups.

Learning methods will include: - case studies, the use of community resource persons, debates, group discussions, hypotheticals, mock trials, visual aid, participant presentations and exhibitions.

4. Entry Requirements

General

In accordance with the University General Entry Requirements for admission to undergraduate degree programmes.

7. Assessment and Deadlines

Each module will be assessed over 100 marks with details as follows (unless otherwise specified):

Assessment will be based on:

Continuous Assessment: 40%

Continuous Assessment will be based on a compulsory written class test and assignments/or oral presentations. The continuous assessment will count for 40% of the overall percentage mark of the module(s), except for a Programme where the structure makes for other specific provision(s).

An overall total of 40% for combined continuous assessment and written examination components would be required to pass the module, without minimum thresholds within the individual continuous assessment and written examination. The same criterion will apply for modules being assessed jointly. Note that all overall mark for the two modules will be considered and not the individual marks for each of the two modules.

Examinations: 60%

A written examination of 2 to 3-hour duration counting for 60% of the overall percentage mark for the module.

Written examinations for all modules will be carried out at the end of the academic year except for semester modules (unless otherwise stated).

Submission Deadline for Dissertation / Research Project

Three copies of the dissertation (two spiral-bound copies and one soft copy in a single PDF text file on electronic storage media) should be submitted to the Faculty/Centre Registry and in addition, a soft copy of the dissertation in a single PDF text file should be uploaded on the "'Turnitin' Platform", in the final assignment submission link indicated by the Programme/Project Coordinator.

All of the above should be submitted not later than the last week day of March of the academic year by 4.00 p.m. at latest, unless specified otherwise in the Programme of Studies.
