Currently, it is expected that the national output to contract by 14% with unemployment reaching some 17% in 2020.

In my discourse, I might be sounding gloomy regarding the global economic outlook, but we should not be oblivious the fact that the impact of the pandemic has caused businesses as well as jobs to be affected at a scale, that was never experienced before. And it is most probable, that you as graduands will be faced with these shocks.

However, there have been sectors, which have embraced digitisation, that are sustaining in these difficult times including the healthcare sector, manufacturing sector, information and media as well as financial services and insurance.

Therefore, being familiar with concepts like artificial intelligence, blockchain, cloud computing, cybersecurity, robotics, and cybersecurity will be an added advantage for you to have a cutting edge in progressing in your career. This brings me to highlighting the importance of Continuous Professional Development, which in my opinion, is also a prerequisite for becoming innovative in your chosen profession. Emerging trends in the world of business demand graduates, who will do something different from the norm and ready to adapt, which happens in most cases.

I have always provided a realistic and objective picture to my staff and family members. Therefore, my advice to you, would be that, given the current economic context, any job is an opportunity since it is not always that "Grass is greener elsewhere". However, it is also your attitude and the way you engage with the outside world that will navigate you throughout your professional journey.

In closing, I would like to leave each of you with the hope that you make your own choices, and you will be able to balance your drive for achievements with a commitment to love and to play, to family and friends and your community and the nation.
